(Background of the poem)

(Background of the poem)

Both His Majesty the Emperor and Her Majesty the Empress have studied at the University of Oxford in the United Kingdom. His Majesty the Emperor read history as a postgraduate student from 1983 to 1985. Her Majesty the Empress, while working at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs before her marriage and during her overseas training period there, was also a postgraduate student in international relations at Oxford from 1988 to 1990.

Last June, when Their Majesties were invited to visit the United Kingdom as state guests, they had a chance to visit together Oxford and spend a day there. Her Majesty the Empress received an honorary doctorate from the university, and their Majesties visited Merton College and Balliol College, their Alma Maters, and other places where they have fond memories. (Background of the poem)

(Background of the poem)
