

## REMARKS BY H.E.TRUONG TAN SANG PRESIDENT OF THE SOCIALIST REPUBLIC OF VIET NAM AT THE STATE BANQUET HOSTED BY HIS MAJESTY EMPEROR AKIHITO

The Vietnamese about to blossom across people believe that spring marks the beginning of a good year and all its blessings. That is why I am most certain that the Japanese people, under the care of Your Majesty the Emperor and with their willpower, talents, wisdom and vitality, will continue to make great achievements for an ever more prosperous Japan.

Your majesties, Ladies and gentlemen,

Viet Nam and Japan have successfully celebrated our 40 years of diplomatic relations. Yet looking into history, we can see that the ties between our countries date back a much longer span of time. Records have shown that over 1000 years ago, as early as the 8th Century, a Vietnamese monk named Buttetsu (Phat Triet) had come to Japan and attended the Eye-opening Ceremony of the Buddha Statue in the Todaiji Pagoda in Nara. Nearly 400 years ago, Japanese merchant ships had crossed the sea to Viet Nam for trading. Their marks remain today in the ancient city of Hoi An, such as the Japanese bridge and the Japanese cemetery. The marriage between a Vietnamese princess and Sotaro Araki, a Japanese merchant, has been celebrated until nowadays in the Nagasaki Kunchi Festival. The series "Partner", a joint-production of the two countries' TV stations aired in 2013, deeply moved a large Vietnamese and Japanese audience with the storyline about the friendship between Vietnamese patriot Phan Boi Chau and the Japanese Doctor Asaba Sakitaro in the early 20th Century.

It is evident that despite geographical distance, cultural similarities and the resonance of compassion between our people were the lasting elements that forge the depth of relations between Viet Nam and Japan, hence the solid foundation for our countries to overcome all geographical barrier and test of time to become not only strategic partners but also true friends.

On the basis of the excellent relations between our countries and to meet the genuine expectations of our people, during this visit, I am discussing with Japanese leaders major directions to take the Viet Nam-Japan relations, which are already at an all-time height, to an even higher, more comprehensive and meaningful level.
